From the Ministry Team

During these last few months of lockdown, I wonder if you have had more opportunity to appreciate nature? Perhaps when you go for your daily exercise you've become more aware of the different birdsong, the wonderful variety of flowers popping up in neighbours' gardens from week to week, and generally to reflect on the beautiful place in which we are blessed to live?

As I write, it is World Environment Day. Every year on 5th June World Environment Day offers a global platform for inspiring positive change – helping us to recognize that global change requires a global community; encouraging people to think about the way they consume; for businesses to develop greener models; for farmers and manufacturers to produce more sustainably; for governments to safeguard wild spaces; and for youth to be inspired to become gatekeepers of a green future. This is something I personally feel very passionate about and I believe we all need to get on board with.

In Psalm 24 we read "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it." It is our duty to respect and honour God's creation by taking the right steps to care for all that He has made.

As Christians we believe humankind has been given 'dominion' over creation (Genesis 1.26); in other words, we are to rule on God's behalf, demonstrating our responsibility of stewardship to care for His creation.

Creation care is also an issue of justice since all humanity is created in God's image. Might our biblical call to look after the oppressed and to love our neighbour as ourselves be reflected in how righteousness and Christian responsibility calls us to be activists for justice? We cannot ignore those who suffer because of our irresponsible actions. It is always the most vulnerable who are victims of famine, drought and crop failure, which the Western world is making worse by the effects of climate change.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has said, "Responding to climate change is an essential part of our responsibility to safeguard God's creation" and "Reducing the causes of climate change is essential to the life of faith. It is a way to love our neighbour and to steward the gift of creation."

Indeed, "To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth" is The Fifth Mark of Mission, adopted by the Church of

England General Synod in 1996.

This is what the Church of England currently states on their website:

"The environment is God's gift to everyone. And we have a responsibility towards each other to protect it. We cannot think of ourselves as isolated from others or from creation. Our impact on the planet is reducing biodiversity, changing the climate, and polluting the earth. Around the world, climate change is affecting food security, creating social vulnerability, and disrupting peace and security. There is no doubt we need to act."

None of us will ever be able to do everything, but each of us can do something to make a difference. God includes us in his plans and can take our small efforts and knit them into his purposes to sustain and renew the earth. My prayer is that we will act now.

Mary never stopped supporting her family and home despite the very full time nature of her working life, but in due course the boys went to College and University, returned home for a while but then Simon & William married and 4 grandchildren arrived. She was extremely proud of her children and their families and liked nothing better than when we were all together for celebrations for birthdays, holidays or for any reason she could dream up. Sadly, Adrian died far too young in 2008.

After leaving the ministry, Betty joined the Land Army because of her love for the land and animals. There her story with Eynsford begins. She passed her test in "putting to" (the horse to the cart) at "Home Farm", Eynsford, then belonging to the Alexander family. She often mentioned riding through Eynsford stream on her bike! Her first working farm position was also at "Home farm" but in St. Pauls Cray. She was in charge of Nobby, a welsh cob. One of her adventures with Nobby was when a German "Doodlebug" bomb dropped into the field next to the one they were harrowing and showered them with soil! She had stories of all her land army days and loved all the work which included fruit picking, milking, ploughing, crop growing and livestock husbandry.

She met her lifelong friend, Lilian, in the land army and they had many happy times together including, with other girls being picked up by army lorries to go to the army dances. Betty and Lilian often went by train, with their bicycles, to Meopham to join the fun at The Kings Head. The train guards waiting for them as they rode down the hill to get the last train home. Betty and Lilian received their Womens Land Army Veterans badges in 2008 (Betty had served for ten years).

Farningham Parish Council met via a video link on Wednesday, 3rd June 2020, and present were six parish councillors (including Sevenoaks District Councillor Philip McGarvey); Kent County Councillor Roger Gough, two members of the public and the Clerk Jane Gray.

New chair and co-opted member:

Liz Bourne took the chair for the first time and immediately thanked Daryl Burns for her three years in the role. Daryl will continue as deputy chair. Two members of the public stood for the vacant councillor position and Latif Oztosun was duly co-opted. A lecturer in travel and tourism with skills in maths and computing, we are delighted to have Latif on board.

Friends of Farningham:

Finally we are sufficiently clear of the Covid-19 virus threat to start our Friends of Farningham season – with appropriate social distancing. As the lockdown slowly eased some of us were able to get out and do a few small jobs in the village so hopefully the weeds on the bridge and at the village hall will not be as robust as they could have been. Unfortunately some of our recent visitors to Irving's Corner have not fully respected the area so there is work to do there. Our first meeting will be on Saturday, 4th July, 10am at the village hall. We are usually together for an hour to tidy up footpaths, pavements and our green spaces and if anyone has a particular area for our volunteers to work on please advise the Clerk. We will meet again on Wednesday, 15th July and subsequently on the first Saturday in the month and so on. August dates are 1st and 12th; September 5th and 16th and October 3rd and 14th. New members will be welcomed with open arms (albeit two metres apart); nothing too strenuous but it all benefits our village. Please bring your own gloves and any light gardening tools you use at home.

Alban Crescent:

We have had many favourable comments on the improvement to the grass area in Alban Crescent, all courtesy of a resident who kindly volunteered to mow and clear the area. Grass cutting has been one of the many problems for Sevenoaks District Council during the lockdown period as priority went to maintaining our weekly household rubbish clearance. It is good to see another local resident giving of their time and lifting the spirit in the crescent. Another Alban Crescent resident told us SDC have supported this initiative by following up instances of damage to the grass caused by car parking and there has also been some police follow-up to complaints about dangerous parking at the entrance.

Road works:

Kent County Council's Roger Gough reported that further work to alleviate flood problems had been carried out at Button Street and Eynsford Road with good progress. More work is needed on the soakaways in Button Street and further investigation into a blocked chamber under the green in Oliver Crescent may help the Eynsford Road situation. Apart from the odd hiccup, KCC are satisfied with the efficiency of the on-line booking system instigated when the Swanley Household Waste and Recycling Centre was finally re-opened. Farningham High Street was closed at short notice in early June for Thames Water works aimed at ending the flooding in Lion Cottages and the entrance to the Mill Estate.

Dog waste bins:

As well as using the dog waste bins, owners have been placing dog waste in the SDC street litter bins for some time now. There have been no reported problems following the fire-enforced removal of the bin in Cinder Path and we will therefore be removing all the dog waste bins in July. Thank you for your co-operation; sadly there has been an increase in dog fouling since lockdown rules were relaxed and there are still anti-social owners who selfishly throw their plastic bags of waste into the grass on Sparepenny Lane and along the river path.

Shopping centres:

Many Sevenoaks Town Centre and other's shops are now re-opening. Although free parking continued on-street and in SDC-owned car parks for the past three months this was to be reviewed by SDC on 22nd June, so do read the signs before you park (especially in Swanley because SDC owns only the little car park in Park Road off the High Street).

Our next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, 1st July 2020, 7.45pm in the Farningham Village Hall with a break for public participation at 9pm. Should it be necessary the meeting will be conducted remotely via the Zoom website and details will be displayed on the noticeboard at the village hall and be available from the Clerk.

The others elected into post are Geoff Kirby - Highways, Alan Cooke - Recreation, Ferne Haxby - Community & Environment, Malcolm Richardson - Planning and Sarah Boyle - Vice-Chair of the Council.

We do still have the one vacancy for a councillor and are hoping to fill the position very soon. If you want to serve your community and make a difference, please put yourself forward. No experience is necessary, just a willingness to get things done; we need you.

Very important news regarding the Sevenoaks Local Plan was released last week. The High Court has granted Sevenoaks District Council permission to bring a judicial review challenge over the conclusion of the planning inspector who examined its draft local plan and found that it had failed to cooperate with neighbouring authorities. This is a major step for Sevenoaks and important for planning matter across the district.

Sadly, the parish was in the news recently with the tragic death of Mr Charles Hilder at Lullingstone; our thoughts are with his family. Kent Police are investigating and seeking information regarding two young male suspects. If anyone has any information, however inconsequential it may seem, please do report it. The police say there is no evidence suggesting the suspects are from any specific area or social group.

The Parish Council have also been working with Laura Trott MP, Roger Gough our Kent County Councillor and representatives of Kent Police and Sevenoaks District Council to resolve the anti-social behaviour issues in the village, particularly the Riverside area. As a first measure we will be installing a series of signs reminding visitors and locals of the behaviours we would expect from them.

Finally, last week I attended the Black Lives Matter event at Common Meadow. The event was a peaceful and joyous occasion, in support of the global organisation so much in the news recently; the organisers and supporters were a credit to our community; thank you. *Philip Ward, Chair*

It could be that since compiling this Probus non-report, there will have been announcements giving us dates when we will be allowed to meet up again but not as I write. However, at this time we have been told the date when we can go shopping in non-essential stores.

Being called non-essential is a bit of a put down and rather unpleasant in any walk of life (although I have become used to it) but I think it's particularly hard on some trading premises. Think about clothes shops. Since the shenanigans in the Garden of Eden, and considering the laws of the land, clothes have become pretty essential and to be sure that I am properly dressed I will be very happy when my personal stylists, Julian and his friend Sandy at 'Man at Millets', become available once again. It would be a direct to site delivery saving him the job of going out to feed his fish and thereby avoiding the risk of being struck by flying parcels. *Joe Irwin*

How Yoga led us to Art..

A few years ago, I started attending a local yoga group (Reyoga). New to the area, I was keen to meet new people and soon made a few friends from the class. Whilst chatting one evening after class, we discovered that we all had a mutual interest in art, both seeing exhibitions and producing it ourselves. We decided to meet occasionally, at each other's homes, to draw and paint whatever took our fancy. Thus, began our "Art Club"!

In the beginning we enjoyed some challenging experiments. For example, drawing in a collaborate way: here we each started to draw the same arrangement, but every 5 mins moved around to add to our neighbour's drawing until we contributed to every drawing in the room. This interesting exercise made us more aware of each other's style and use of material – as well as removing the responsibility for our "own" drawing! We selected a variety of topics to draw; if the weather permitted, we drew outside, pictures of trees or the plants in each other's gardens. We have also tried portraiture, but have found still life to be the easiest subject to arrange.

Our group grew from four original members to now six. Our meetings are not confined to Eynsford; last year, we attended a workshop session at the National Portrait Gallery. We were asked to imagine and then draw modern-day costumes on the women featured in some of their eighteenth and nineteenth century paintings. A fun challenge – and in the tradition of our meetings, we all enjoyed a glass or two of wine afterwards!

Last summer saw us setting up stall on the Eynsford Cricket Club's hallowed ground, as part of the Eynsford Gardeners Club 140th Big Summer Birthday Bash. Some of our best work was on display and we had hoped to offer our own workshops to visitors, but were surprised to find how many were reluctant to even try to draw, despite a long desire to. It seems that some past experiences may have put people off, leading them to think that they could not draw, which we thought was very sad. We also staged a children's art competition and found that kids were much happier to get involved than parents! The lucky winners were presented with some art materials.

The Lockdown has of course meant that we have had to adapt our meetings and go online through Zoom. Artist Grayson Perry's recent programme "Art Club" on Channel 4 also gave us inspiration to keep meeting. Each week we would take the theme of his most recent episode - "Animals", 'Fantasy" and "Britain' were a few examples - and pledged to produce something of our own for our next week's meeting. "Fantasy" seemed to be the most inspiring;. As for the future, we have talked about the possibility of staging an exhibition of our work, but of course that will be a project for after the Lockdown. In the meantime, we will keep on drawing, and experimenting - our most recent challenge is to master the fine art of Linoprinting..... Anne Marie Fereday

"This little Guiding light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine"

The Brownies have been "keeping their Guiding light shining" during lockdown, with activities provided to them to complete as and when their circum-



stances allow. You may have spotted stones (or in some cases posters) bearing "positive" messages from the Brownies. Various girls have also embraced the #WindowWellness campaign to raise a smile through window decorations, many with a Rainbow theme in support of the NHS. One enterprising Brownie even placed outgrown books at the end of her driveway with a collecting jar to raise money for the NHS.

Just before face-to-face meetings were suspended, the Brownies made tissue-paper sunflowers for mothering Sunday, and also planted a dwarf sunflower seed each, to grow at home and encourage pollinating insects into village gardens. The first flowers have now opened, and bees are buzzing around them. Brownies have also been making bug hotels ready to accommodate such welcome "guests" over the winter, and will be undertaking a mini-beast safari.

Over half term we invited the girls to a "Camp At Home" with shared menu, activities and campfire programme. Some camped outdoors in tents, others made improvised "dens". Some tried "eggy bread" for the first time (apparently it's good with Nutella). We enjoyed hotdogs, smores (prepared by various ingenious smokeless means) and chocolate bananas...and for their main meal girls had to come up with (and help cook) their own choice of meal *suitable* for cooking over a wood fire. Menu choices included: chilli/rice, tuna/pasta, homemade burgers in home-made muffins (cooked in a skillet)...

In these times where many are facing hardship, we have asked the Brownies to consider the staggering quantities of still-edible food that gets wasted each year, and how various charities are working to recover this food and redistribute it to the millions of UK citizens who go hungry each day, even under "normal" circumstances. Girls have worked with their families to devise a home food-waste action-plan, and have been experimenting with making meals using safe leftovers that would otherwise be wasted, supplemented by "storecupboard" ingredients. Judging from some of the photographic "evidence", these Brownie "Food Waste Heroes" have acquired some valuable life skills.

All in all, we've been keeping busy, but are looking forward to actually being able to run around together again some day.

A Zero Waste Recipe from Ann Storr

Warm feta and tomato sauce Serves 2-4

Ingredients

4 tablespoons olive oil
1 x 400g whole tinned tomatoes
2 pinches dried oregano
1/2 teaspoon ground coriander
Leftover feta (up to ½ a packet)
1/4 - 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika black pepper

Tools

Frying pan, Lid for frying pan, Wooden spoon, Bowl, Measuring spoons/ teaspoon, Chopping board and knife (if cutting up pitta bread), Toaster

To serve: pitta breads, toasted and dipped. or flatbreads, or plain tortilla chips

Prep

Empty the tomatoes into a bowl and crush them with your hands

Method

Heat the oil until it is *just* beginning to smoke. Pour the tomatoes quickly and place the lid on immediately

LISTEN; as soon as the sizzling dies down, take the lid off. Add the oregano & coriander

Simmer for 10 minutes (Simmering: not quite boiling, just how you want a tin of soup to heat)

When the 10 minutes are up,, start toasting your pitta breads/warming wraps. Add the feta to the pan and stir gently. When the cheese begins to melt remove from the heat and crack black pepper all over

Serve with breads/tortilla chips

Eynsford in Bloom

As the Corvid-19 lockdown has been relaxed we have resumed our work parties: 9.30--11.30 am Tuesday mornings, 6--7pm Thursday evenings and 9.30--11.30 am on the first Saturday every month. New volunteers would be very welcome. We now bring our own tools, gloves and hand sanitizer. We meet in the main car park opposite St. Martin's Church and disperse to different sites.

Adam Bailey pruned the silver birch tree in the tub adjacent to Ford House to prevent damage to the roof tiles . Adam will return in the autumn for further pruning of the three silver birches .

At the war memorial the winter bedding plants have been removed , and fertilizer forked into the soil with hand forks . The watering system has been checked and is working . To celebrate 75 years since the Victory in Europe during World War 2, red , white and blue plants have have been used for the formal bedding .

Carole and Colin have removed the winter bedding plants and planted the summer bedding in eleven tubs around the village using red and white geraniums , blue trailing lobelia and white bacopa . They have also been weeding , pruning and maintaining the sites around the station area . Thank you .

The winter bedding has been removed from the three tubs and front borders at the main car park . Fertilizer has been hand forked into the soil before red and white geraniums were planted .Two volunteers started the pruning of the shrubs and sycamore hedge and it will be continued during future work parties .

Two work parties have given 28 hours work in the village hall drive . The annual fall for the holly leaves has started early this year , possibly due to the dry May . These leaves are very prickly but have to be removed ,along with twigs , weeds , the large grass and spreading violets . The soil was hand forked and four areas planted with polyanthus . In front of the village hall the two mangers have been emptied , the border tidied and the hedge trimmed .

Next to the long footpath in St. Martin's Church yard polyanthus and Thalia Narcissus have been planted . The Rose Garden needs the grass edges trimming frequently . Four volunteers worked for 30 minutes to dead head and tidy the roses . Recent rain meant it was not necessary to water plants on Thursday evening so the ivy , completely covering a grave , was removed

by the three volunteers.

I have visited three gardens to look at orchids on their lawns . They had 4 , 24 and the third had a large number very scattered . All were Pyramidal and are not yet in full boom . Bird's- foot- trefoil is growing in Eynsford Rise verges . The house martins have rebuilt their nests . For the next four weeks we will be enjoying the longest days of the year .

All work parties meet in the main car park opposite St. Martin's Church . Volunteers need to bring their own tools , gloves and hand sanitizer . Future work party dates :

The Local History Centre celebrates its 15th Anniversary

There have been several previous attempts to set up a Museum or Centre for local history in Eynsford. In 1904 Elliott Downs Till founded a Museum at Little Mote, but how long it lasted is unknown. Before the Second World Ernest Greenfield set up another Museum at Riverside which was bombed in the autumn of 1940. Thirdly, after the war in 1947 an outbuilding at Lullingstone was taken over by Darent Valley Archaeological Research, with the aim of building a permanent Museum. All came to nothing.

Then in the 1980s along came Farningham and Eynsford Local History founded to aid research into the local area and to house a permanent collection as a resource for residents and researchers. Two frustrating decades followed, with a growing collection being moved from the waiting room at Eynsford Station, to Peter Gee's garage, to a barn at Maplescombe, and to Horton Kirby Education Centre before finally its present home, former public toilets, was made available by Eynsford Parish Council, and converted by the Society, It was opened in 2005 and now houses a wealth of information - documents, maps, photographs, artefacts - about the local communities it serves.

History Corner – Jan Wilkes

Anyone for Tennis

Sometime during 1873 at a weekend house party was held at Lullingstone Castle. Among the guests were Mr John Heathcote (Writer and tennis player) and Mr Julian Marshall (Barrister and real tennis player). Both men were keen athletes and together with Sir William Hart Dyke they drew up the rules for lawn tennis, which later developed into the game we know today. The first match played in England took place on the lawn at Lullingstone near the gatehouse. The centre line was a ladder supported by two barrels and the court was wider at the base than at the centre, being marked out with tapes and pegs. The racquets at this time were small and pear shaped.

By 1877 the All England Lawn Tennis & Croquet Club were proposing the First Wimbledon Championships. Mr John Heathcote and Mr Julian Marshall together with Mr Henry Jones on the All England Club laid down the rules of the game that have changed little to this day. The first Wimbledon Tournament was held on 9th July 1877. That day 22 amateurs showed up to complete in the Gentlemen's

Singles Tournament (Ladies invited to join the Tournament in 1884)) at a cost of one guinea entry. The winner was Mr Spencer William Gore

The following extracts are from So Spins the Silkworm written by Zoe Hart Dyke:

'We had a lovely summer this year (1938), and the North Kent Lawn Tennis Association, of which I was Vice-President, made me two requests. The first, that I should take about 700 members round the Farm (Silk farm) personally and secondly, that Oliver should allow the Association to stage a "period" tennis match. Both requests were granted.'

The game became popular and daring ladies who played it shed frames and frills from their crinolines and used an underhand service with scooping returns. The Association re-enacted the match perfectly, before an audience of many hundreds of people. Tom Booker and his brother, who by now were





both well over eighty years old, had been ball boys at the famous 1873 match, and they were persuaded to re-enact their part'.

Eynsford & Farningham in Solidarity with Black Lives Matter

On Sunday 7th June, Florence-Mae bravely stood up in front of 150 people gathered at Eynsford Cricket Ground to read her poem:

My name is Florence. I am seven years old. Black Lives Matter.
My skin is brown, and my hair is curly. Black Lives Matter.
I'm scared for my future, I almost lost my brother. Black Lives Matter.
In a gang to fit in, then stabbed in the street. Black Lives matter.
Why is no one listening? Change is needed! Black Lives Matter.
Hear our voices when we shout 'I CAN'T BREATHE'. Black. Lives. Matter.

Her mother Nicki explained that as her son grew up in a predominately white neighbourhood, he found it difficult to find a sense of identity and a place to fit in.

Dillon, a local father, shared a story; 'When my daughter was 8 years old, she was playing in a playground, a child told her she should not play with another child, because that other child was black. The child did not realise my daughter herself was mixed race. My daughter stood up for that child and by doing so also stood up for herself....Children are not born racist, they pick things up from homes, we need to break that cycle, teach ourselves, teach our children...Racism needs a cure, and we are that cure'.

In between speeches a live Brass Band played 'Strange Fruit' by Billie Holiday, a protest song against the lynching of Black Americans, followed by 'Amazing Grace' to end the 2-minute silence.

The Kent Police, members of the Parish Council and Eynsford Cricket Club were in full support of the peaceful and socially distanced protest.

In response to the event, Genevieve from Hextable said 'as a Black South African woman this event brought a tear to my eye. The amount of white enlightened people present gave me hope as I have felt exhausted - these last few months especially. As a black person, trying to educate others can be exhausting. The message that came across strongly for me was those with privilege need to educate themselves and others and not just rely on the oppressed to do it. Thank you all from a very sad, frustrated and angry but hopeful and grateful Person of Colour.'

As white folk, the best thing we can do is educate ourselves and others. We recommend Maya Angelou's 'I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings' and Reni Eddo-Lodge's 'Why I'm No Longer Talking to White People about Race'. We must

also act on what we have learnt. We can get together with friends at school/university and demand to be taught about our colonial past and racist present. We can encourage our local parish to make a collection for those suffering on account of their race. We can suggest the adoption of racial promotion quotes in our workplace.

To capture and preserve the energy from the protest, a Facebook Group called 'Eynsford and Farningham for Social Justice' has been created to discuss/educate/ protest/promote issues important for a fairer and more just society. New walks have been discovered. The gardens have never looked better. Motorway noise has diminished and birdsong has just got louder.


Let's hope meetings can resume as soon as possible. Lots to catch up on. Speakers to look forward to. Stay in touch and remain positive. *Gill Govus*



Eynsford Weather Data

May 2020 James Alexander





National Overview. May started off showery, but high pressure then built across the country and brought mostly warm, dry and sunny weather. Northerly winds brought much cooler weather mid-month, with scattered showers mainly in the east and some overnight frosts. Westerly winds then brought less settled weather at times, but in the last week high pressure brought warmth and almost unbroken sunshine for much of the country. The mean temperature for May was 1.1°C above the long-term average. The mean maximum temperature was the 3rd highest since 1884, but the mean minimum temperature was close to normal. It was the driest May since 1862 and the sunniest since 1929, with just 17% of average rainfall and 157% of average sunshine.

<u>In Eynsford</u> we had 1.5mm (0.06") rain which fell on the first of the month, with the rest of the month dry. It was the driest May since 1949, which is as far back as my records go. There were three very late frosts in the middle of the month which have probably caused some damage.

Bus Times from June 2020

Go Coach have replaced all their bus services in the Sevenoaks area, including Route 2 serving Eynsford, with an "on demand" service marketed as "Go2" whereby, with the use of a mobile phone app "Go2 Sevenoaks", or by contacting Go Coach by phone on 01732 463964, you can order a bus to collect you from a local stop and take you to Swanley or Sevenoaks (or points in between). The service was introduced on 14 April for 3 months, operating from 6am - 6pm on Mondays to Fridays and 8am - 6pm on Saturdays, at the same cost as normal bus fares and with Concessionary bus passes accepted. Depending upon its success or otherwise, these arrangements may be continued beyond 14 July but this remains to be confirmed.

The 429 bus route from West Kingsdown, through Farningham to Swanley and Dartford has now returned to its normal timings on Mondays to Fridays with departures from Farningham, Pied Bull to Swanley at 06.07 and 06.47, then from 07.34 to Swanley and Dartford and every hour from 09.37 to 14.37, then at 16.52 and 17.52. Return journeys from Dartford, Lowfield Street leave at 08.37, then every hour from 09.32 to 13.32. The 14.32 departure terminates at Swanley. but the 15.32, 16.47, 17.47 and 18.47 continue through to Farningham and West Kngsdown. Departure times from Swanley, Bartholomew Way are every hour from 09.00 to 14.00 then at 16.02, 17.15, 18.15 and 19.15.

On Saturdays there is only a bus every two hours leaving Farningham, Pied Bull at 08.37, 10.37, 12.37, 14.37 and 16.37; returning from Dartford, Lowfield Street at 09.32, 11.32, 13.32, 15.32 and 17.32 and from Swanley, Bartholomew Way at 10.00, 12.00, 14.00, 16.00 and 18.00.

It is also planned to reinstate the Sunday service to Bluewater leaving Eynsford Station at 09.30, 11.55 and 15.05 and Farningham 4 minutes later; returning from Bluewater at 10.30, 13.40 and 16.10, from Darent Valley Hospital 6 minutes later, Dartford, Lowfield Street 13 minutes later and from Swanley at 11.08, 14.18 and 16.48.

Frequent bus services operate between Dartford, Darent Valley Hospital and Bluewater every day including the 477 bus route, operated by Arriva, from Swanley, currently running every 40 minutes on Mondays to Fridays, every 75 minutes on Saturdays and every 90 minutes on Sundays.

Bus and train services should still only be used for travel to and from work, for shopping, or for medical supplies or appointments and, from 15 June, face coverings are required to be worn on all buses and trains.

All times are subject to last minute changes, so it is best to check with www.go-coach.co.uk for their Go2 and 429 services, with www.arrivabus.co.uk/kent-and-surrey for the 477 and other buses to Bluewater, and with www.nationalrail.co.uk for train times before travelling. *David Toser*
