Because of Lockdowns etc, a handful of subscribers in two roads did not get around to returning their 2020 subscriptions to their local deliverer, and they are asked to make good this year, please.

#### From the Ministry Team

As I sit writing this month's message, the sun is shining, snowdrops and daffodils are sprouting up around the villages, and the children have just started to return to school. The restrictions we have had on and off over this last year are starting to ease, but we do need to continue to be careful, and stay safe even with the vaccinations going ahead as they are.

Is this the start of Spring, but in a different way than that which we have known before?

#### St Martin's - Eco Church!

#### PLASTIC BAGS

No doubt we are all aware of the environmental damage caused by plastic packaging, particularly carrier bags and soft plastic food wrappings that cannot go into our recycling bags for collection at the kerbside. Most worrying is the devastating

damage it causes to marine life.

Government action has helped to reduce single-use carrier bags, so that it is now normal practice to take our bags with us when we go shopping. In 2014 the average person in England took 140 free carrier bags from the main supermarkets. In 2015 a 5p charge was imposed and by last year this usage had reduced by 95%. Yes, a success story, until we realise that the seven big supermarkets still sold 226 million bags last year! In April this year the charge is being raised to 10p in England and extended to all shops. Let's hope this will help us all to remember to take our bags with us when we go to the supermarket. (Information from Defra.)

But this is just the start. What about all the plastic that our food is wrapped in? Even those supermarkets that sell mesh bags to put loose fruit and veg in, do not always give us much opportunity to buy loose. It is estimated that the UK supermarkets use 800,000 tons of plastic every year. Some of the big supermarkets are beginning to take responsibility for this. Tesco has just announced that there will be collection points in their main stores to recycle carrier bags, crisp packets, pet and baby food pouches, and plastic food wrappings like bread bags and fruit and veg packaging. They will also accept plastics from other retailers. Tesco expects to collect 1,000 tons of soft plastic a year, and they will use the recycled material for much of their new packaging.

We asked around at our local supermarkets. Sainsbury's in Otford has a discreet black bin tucked away in a corner of the main entrance. This is for all types of plastic bags. Waitrose has a bin by the exit to the carpark for carrier bags. If you have home deliveries from either of these supermarkets, you can give your plastic to the driver for recycling.

In our villages, the school, St Martin's Church and the local parish council have started up schemes to collect crisp packets and some other hard-to-recycle plastics. The parish council scheme remains open but the others have stalled with lockdown restrictions, but look out for news of them re-opening.

#### **FAREWELL ASHLEY RIVETT**

The village is mourning the loss of another of its larger-than-life characters following the news that Ashley Rivett passed away on Wednesday (27 January) at the age of 63. Ashley was brought up in St Martin's Drive and many villagers will remember attending primary school and Eynsford cubs & scouts with him. He later followed in his father's footsteps by becoming a scout troop leader.



After leaving Swanley Comprehensive secondary school Ashley worked at The Telegraph newspaper group and then changed careers to become a security guard. He was always involved in village life, assisting the Vicar at St Martin's Church, and making occasional appearances for The Riverside Players. One of his appearances is still amusingly remembered when, during a performance of She Stoops to Conquer, he delivered the immortal line 'The Squire has got spunk in him' with such gusto that the audience burst into

Other village pursuits included being a founder player with Darent Valley RFC after an inaugural match on Harrow Meadow in 1977 between The Five Bells and The Lion Hotel, Farningham. It is fair to say Ashley was an even bigger supporter of the after-match entertainment and other club events. He never missed the annual trip to the Epsom Derby or the Oval Ball. Ashley also helped organise club nights in The Coach House at The Pied Bull in Farningham. Alongside rugby, he was a keen football fan and volunteered for a number of years as a steward at Charlton Athletic. Ashley could often be found socialising in the Five Bells and he also worked behind the bar when David and Di Kerr were the landlords. He made a brief appearance in '20 Miles from Piccadilly', the 1994 fly-on-the-wall TV documentary about living in Eynsford.

He found romance later in life after meeting up again with Sandra, one of his former sweethearts. After getting married they eventually moved to live in Aldingbourne, West Sussex, but Ashley made regular visits back to the village to meet up with old friends in 'The Bells'. In normal circumstances many of Ashley's friends and former work colleagues would have been at his funeral on 11 February at the Reynolds (funeral director) chapel in Bognor Regis to pay their respects. Unfortunately, the pandemic meant numbers were restricted, but once conditions allow social gatherings, those who knew Ashley can meet up in The Bells to give him a proper send off.

#### Sheila Mary Williams 19<sup>th</sup> March, 1927 – 24<sup>th</sup> January 2021

It is with great sadness that I am writing to tell of my mother's passing. Sheila was born in Downham, where she lived for four years before moving to Lee with her four-year old sister Doreen, mother, father and grandparents. In 1939, Sheila and Doreen were evacuated to Deal, then Folkestone and eventually to Abertillery in South Wales. Returning to London in 1943 at the age of sixteen, Sheila was determined to find work. After a six-month gardening course in Northamptonshire, she became a journeyman at Tewin Water House in Welwyn, Hertfordshire. In her late teens she returned to her family in Lee working as a landscape gardener. After a while Sheila decided to find indoor work.



There was a shortage of teachers after the war, so Sheila took a foundation course at Goldsmiths,

which is where she and my father Mick fell in love. They were married in 1948. Sheila was 21, Mick 25. They moved in with Mick's family in Woolwich, completed their training and both worked as teachers. They often cycled with friends to Eynsford and fell for the area, moving to Eynsford Rise (with Sheila's parents) in 1953. Later that year they adopted Richard and two years later, Stephen. After Richard began school, Sheila decided to start a nursery school from home. This ran happily for many years. In the mid-sixties, she started remedial teaching at Horton Kirby School, followed by natural studies, modern dance and eventually bamboo pipe making and playing until she retired in 1980.

As a child she was infatuated with ballet, and in the sixties and seventies, belonged to a modern dance company, which frequently had shows. Sheila also sang alto for many years in St Martins Church Choir, and in the Darent Valley Choir. Another keen interest for both Sheila and Mick was gardening, and they had an allotment on the Elm Tree site in Station Road. Sheila joined with friends in Eynsford Rise to make music and to share her love of poetry.

Mum was a calm person, happy with life, and she lived it to the full. She had so many talents, an adventurous spirit and she made life-long friends, who along with the family, will miss her deeply.

#### **Eynsford Gardeners' Club**

#### Forking weather...

Now is the time of year to dig out your fork and spade from the tool shed and remove last year's soil and rust ready for turning over your veg patch (you really ought to clean your tools before you put them away).



Haven't quite decided what to grow this year but will probably the usual courgettes, runner beans and the dreaded Jerusalem Artichokes. We have Globe Artichokes but they are in the flower bed as the silver foliage and stunning purple flowers make a great display. The runner beans I shall grow up an obelisk as it takes up less space. I have already planted my tomato seeds in trays in the back bedroom. I have decided that this year I shall concentrate on the Tumbling Toms planted in wall pots on the back fence (South facing) rather than full size plants in the greenhouse. The tumblers seem to produce just as much fruit per plant and don't need so much looking after.

I know that we shouldn't start casting our clouts yet but I shall remove the fleece from the lemon tree and hope that the sunlight will aid its recovery. It seems to have shed more than a few leaves over this winter. The problem is it has grown too large to bring inside although it is in a wheeled pot so I can move it right back into the shelter of the back of the house.

I am having another go at turning the front lawn slope into a wild meadow. It dries out so quickly the grass doesn't grow very well and it's so steep it's a pain to mow. I did sprinkle half a packet of meadow flower seeds last autumn with the intention of doing the other half this spring; only trouble is I can't find the packet with the remaining half! I know I put it somewhere safe. I should have put it in the seed box with all the leftover seeds I don't really need.

As you have probably gathered the Spring show has had to be cancelled but we are still running the Hyacinth competition although this will be judged from photos. This year there will be a prize for the best hyacinth. Can you email your photo to Eynsford\_gc@yahoo.co.uk by 6<sup>th</sup> April. Photos will appear on the Eynsford Gardeners' Club Facebook page and the website.

By now your hyacinth pot should be indoors. Keep it well watered. You will have to judge how to get the bulb to flower at the right time. Give it more heat and sun to push the bloom on, or cool conditions to hold it back [even put it outside again]. For example if the leaves develop faster than the flower bud, move to a cooler place and cover again to keep them in dark for a day or two, but no

Farningham Parish Council met via a video link on Wednesday, 3<sup>rd</sup> March 201, and present were seven parish councillors (including Sevenoaks District Councillor Philip McGarvey), Kent County Councillor Roger Gough and the Clerk Amanda Barlow.

Our perfect storm: In respect of bin collections missed because of the snow and ice in February, Sevenoaks District Council management now accepts that its lines of communication failed to reach enough residents quickly enough, or were confusing, so SDC will use additional channels (including emailing Parish Clerks) if this happens again. The problem was magnified by KCC having closed the Waste Transfer Station at Dunbrik two weeks earlier (to continue making repairs after last year's fire) and a bin lorry breaking down in mid-round in South Darenth. Although the snow made a few roads impassable on just the first day, ice made the pavements dangerous for a few more days. The "catch-up" mountain to shift the next week was therefore double that of normal and compounded by SDC lorries having to dump their loads further away. If this ever happens again residents could help with resulting pressure on space in the lorries by holding back their recycling. Having said all that, we sincerely thank the staff for their tremendous efforts in doing an otherwise thankless task. It is also worth noting that, as well as the SDC website's information on refuse collection, the Farningham Parish Council website has a question and answer segment containing such information and details on such issues is disseminated on Facebook and Twitter by FPC for those wishing to access via those routes.

Friends of Farningham: Government pandemic guidelines permitting, we will start our bi-monthly meetings on Saturday, 1<sup>st</sup> May – 10am at the village hall. We plan to then meet every third Wednesday and first Saturday in the month up until October. We have in past years cleared weeds and leaves from various places around the village and organised litter-picks alongside the river and in various roads. Our clear-ups have made a difference and been a rewarding experience. We have a circulation list of FoF members and these will be contacted. Details will also be sent to those on our Parish Council circulation list - sign up for this on our Website – and we would, as ever, welcome new members and any suggestions for projects within the village. We meet for about an hour and all that is needed to take part are a pair of gloves, tools you may use in your own garden, and strong shoes. Further details are available from the Clerk or Cllr Carol Salmon, carolsalmon46@gmail.com or phone 01322 860983.

**Annual Parish Council Meeting:** Unfortunately we will not be holding an Annual Parish Meeting (for reports to/from the public and societies) this year but we will still have our annual Parish Council Meeting (for election of Chairman etc) on Wednesday, May 5<sup>th</sup>. Further details are available from the Clerk.

Traffic updates from Kent County Council: Cllr Gough said the traffic count in the High Street would begin on 20 March. Although this might sound rather counter-intuitive, KCC will allow us to have a 20mph limit if the average speed limit taken by the speed tests is less than 26mph. So, as ever, please try to drive carefully in the village, particularly over the speed test strips! The results will be available in mid-April and then the issue will be debated, along with the feasibility of our other suggestions for a traffic improvement scheme. £10m of KCC funding has been set aside for another pothole blitz across the county with last year's work resulting in over 600 one metre square potholes filled in.

#### We had on our Agenda:

<u>Treasurer</u>: Toni McCoy reported that EVS is solvent but would benefit from an injection of funds which have not been available in 2020/1 as we have been unable to hold the usual fund-raising events.

Arthur Mee's Seat: EVS is not really responsible for it but it is understood to need care to make it safe; Phil Blakemore and Ed Holbrook will take a look at it when we are able to go out and the weather suitable as access is awkward. There is an EVS plaque which we think is with John Gee; perhaps it can either go back on the seat or if the seat cannot be mended, it be staked at the site.



Following my various appeals over the months, I have received 2 emails which are vehemently opposed to the idea, about 10 very much in favour with some willing to join a cleaning rota, many verbal expressions of support as I have mooched around the village, and even 2 financial donations to help set it up (unheard of).

The most important thing we need to decide is what we would like to use it for if we go to the trouble and expense of installing it, for there will be a set-up cost to EVS of perhaps as much as £500 for labour and materials. And EVS money is our money to spend how we see fit. Every resident of Eynsford is automatically a member so we each have an equal say in how we use funds.

I have agreed with the Committee members that we will make this an Agenda item at the next AGM for open discussion in the hope a positive consensus will emerge and that a purpose can be agreed; please come armed with ideas. If the majority are against it, so be it and I wont sulk for long!

<u>AOB</u>: EVS is winding up the <u>Public Art Trail</u> leaving one project incomplete (Daren&Val) as it has proved too ambitious to deliver easily. We are having a map printed on A4 and folded into 3 sections to use as publicity for the trail in the hope both locals and visitors will walk it with picnics in the summer months and enjoy each of the artworks in their given spot; each installation has been chosen for its relevance to its location.






There are no prizes if your chosen tree is picked - it's just for fun. But, the winning tree and it's story, will be featured on our website, social media and in our next newsletter.

### **Eynsford in Bloom**

Our work parties were cancelled for two weeks due to snow lying and then the soil left very wet. Soil continues to be washed away from the Riverside border when the lorries drive through the ford. The plants in this border have been pruned, a washed out Hebe replanted, all weeded and tidied. New soil and grass seed will be added when the River level goes down.

During the recent four work parties sixteen volunteers have helped, some once and some every time. Administratively our secretary, Sue, and treasurer, Toni, have, as always, been working. Chris is reporting on Facebook our work and problems. These include the theft of snowdrops from under the mosaic on the school fence, the damage to daffodils near the station and the trampling of plants beyond the railway bridge.

Cutting back the Rose of Sharon is completed. Rose pruning on the Garden of Remembrance has continued for three weeks and the eighty plants fertilized. The

soil has been hoed leaving the lovely display of cyclamen and primroses.

Ten bags of compost from St. Martin's Church yard have been used along one border in the car park. More will be used to raise the level of some graves and grass seed will be sown. The Olive Seal Hall gutters and path were cleaned. Litter, the fallen Cotoneaster tree and large piles of tree prunings have been removed from the station triangle. Croci in Four Tree Island and elsewhere in the village have been beautiful. The daffodil banks are in flower giving wonderful welcome colour.

The Riverside Club hedge has been cut and the footpath swept removing old leaves and fallen alder catkins. Two Potentillas have been planted in the car park border against Ford House and the two borders in front of the car park tidied. The snowdrops are going over. Some are being divided and replanted. Thank you Ed for giving twelve hours (or more) work in the Church yard.

During half term holiday week two Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award volunteers undertook environmental and gardening work in the village. Their litter pick in Millfield yielded 24 glass bottles and other rubbish. They helped to clear the border in front of the A.R.P.S. Kindergarten and the School's Gardening Club site, and Eynsford in Bloom's allotment. Crushing drinks tins to helped to raise £17 for Guide Dogs for the Blind. They will continue their voluntary work during the Easter holiday and we are grateful for their help.

We needed to reduce the cost of our summer bedding order so recently ordered begonias with a pink and white colour theme. Geraniums are more expensive. We continue to add to our shrubs, drought tolerant and bee friendly perennials. Frogs spawn was found on 2nd March in a garden pond in Sparepenny Lane. Brimstone butterflies are in flight on sunny days. Patches, some large, of dog violets are in flower.

Due to Covid-19 we do not meet as a group. Volunteers will be contacted, should telephone or email to confirm where work is required and enable us to conform with social distancing regulations. We are wearing masks and bring our own masks, gloves, hand tools and sanitizer.

### **Making Changes**

I am part of the Thursday morning virtual Home Group, meeting on Zoom. We are following the Church of England 2020 Lent course #Live Lent - Care for God's Creation. If you remember, the start of the first national COVID-19 lockdown, 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2020, was during Lent, and our Benefice Lenten home group face to face meetings had to stop.

Lent is a time for reflection. Christians remember Christ's withdrawal into the desert for forty days. It is a time to re-evaluate and face God, who has entrusted us to look after his wonderful creation. As Archbishops Justin Welby and John Sentamu write in their introduction to the course "We are called to care for and honour God's creation as a way of delighting in its Creator. We are also called to care for our brothers and sisters all over the world who face having their families uprooted and their livelihoods destroyed by the effects of climate change. As part of our discipleship to Jesus Christ every single one of us has a responsibility to live a life of stewardship."

Many Christians use Lent as an opportunity to give something up, to remember that Christ went without during his time in the wilderness. The Archbishops encourage us to consider giving something up as well to help the environment, because if many of us do little things, they can add up to make a big difference.

I have long been meaning to eliminate palm oil from what I consume. This Lent I set myself the task of educating myself, to actually make it happen. I researched online to find the many different names that palm oil might go under – this list I found on the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) website.

This site had easy to understand icons to click on to find out what products had palm oil in and why – for example shampoo, pizza dough, chocolate, instant noodles.

The debate around "certified sustainable palm oil" which all our big supermarkets trumpet as being a "good" way of still stocking products that have palm oil in, is a tricky one indeed. I was taken aback to find on the WWF website the statement "Palm oil is by far the most efficient vegetable oil to grow as it takes less land to

produce than other vegetable oils". A Greenpeace press release of 4 November 2019 led with "Consumers are being misled by a labelling scheme widely used by UK supermarkets to claim that the palm oil they use is 100% certified sustainable." As Richard George, Head of Forests at Greenpeace UK said: "Consumers are being conned by 'certified sustainable palm oil', a phrase that's bandied about by supermarkets and big brands attempting to distance themselves from deforestation. But the phrase is utterly meaningless because the body responsible for certifying palm oil is made up of some of the most destructive growers and producers in Indonesia. This is a henhouse insurance scheme run by foxes."

I intend to use my power as a consumer to eliminate palm oil from my life. Will you join me?

### **History corner - Jan Wilkes**

Continued from March edition of Trident and in Diana Clark's own words. We left off with Thomas and Alice coming to live in Rablus Place, Farningham.

### <u>Thomas Couchman – Blacksmith (Part 2)</u>

This is where my father Edward Mills was born in 1896, he was second eldest and eventually of ten children born there (Grannie's eldest born in 1894 and her last a daughter born in 1915).

How Grannie Mills managed in a tiny 2 up and 2 down with the privy in the yard, but by the time the 1914 was came along, my dad Edward and his elder brother Fred were fighting in France.

I would have liked to know more of great grandfather Thomas Couchman, in a photo I have he certainly looked the part of a blacksmith, a stocky tough man with a big bushy beard. He liked his drink evidently, so did his wife, luckily the pub was just over the road, The Chequers opposite. When Thomas died Grannie Alice moved to a cottage opposite The Bull where she lived with help from her big family. (She's buried with Thomas in Farningham churchyard)

A bit more about the Barbers of Eynsford. My father's cousin was Frederick Barber, son of Henry and Ann, he was much older than my father, Edward Mills'. Frederick had fought as a very young man in the Boar War. It appears he was a

keen soldier, he also fought in the 1914-18 war and then he failed trying to enlist in the last war. Frederick Barber was always called Frenchie, a nick name he got though his fighting years.

When he married, he moved into Bower Cottage and he lived there until he died. He always wore a bowler hat, as a little girl just after the war my dad

Edward Mills took me to watch Frenchie lay the bricks of the new barns at Home Farm for Alexanders, as they were bombed about the same time as the cottages next to the Plough Inn were bombed.

Thomas Couchman's children did very well for themselves, several lived in Farningham. His son Jesse Couchman lived with his wife Ruth at Holt Place a row of houses just up from the Chequers Pub. They had one son William who sadly was gassed at Ypres in France in 1918, he was sent home to die. He was just twenty. It was heart-breaking for Jesse and Ruth losing their only child, it caused friction in the family, between the Mills family, as my father Edward and his older brother Frederick survived the Great War



My grandmother Alice has four more younger sons but all too young to go to war. Jesse and Ruth were well known and highly thought of throughout the Darenth Valley and certainly they did not leave behind a single enemy.

During 57 years of Jesse and Ruth's married life, it is said not a single missword passed between them. They were a most devoted couple and ideal mem-

bers of Farningham Darby and Joan Club. Jesse was proud of his record of 63 years as a Bell Ringer every Sunday at Farningham church.

Sadly, Jesse and Ruth died within two days of each other. They were laid to rest with their son William in 1949 in Farningham church yard, where Jesse would hear the bells ringing every Sunday.



<u>National Overview.</u> February began quite mild in southern areas, but from the 6th it became steadily colder, with bitter easterly winds and low temperatures during the second week. It was also an unsettled period, and eastern counties had much snow in that second week. The latter half of the month was decidedly milder, and it also became more settled as time went on. The mean temperature for February was 0.7°C above the long-term average. Rainfall was 121% of average and sunshine was 100% of average, with totals in southern areas rather below average despite plenty of sunshine here during the last few days.

<u>In Eynsford</u> we received 47mm (1.9") of rain, which is 90% of average, over 13 days. The first week was very wet, turning cold with snow on the 7th & 8th. It then turned dry with only a little rain intermittent during the remainder of the month.
